### Why remove weeds?

We weed to remove or reduce the competition experienced by the plants we want from the plants we don't want. Most of us learn about weeding in our home gardens where weeds can usually all be removed, albeit with constant effort. Weeding the bush is different; we can't hope to remove all the weeds. The best that we can do is reduce their impact by strategising and prioritising where and how

we apply our effort. Leave your gardening hat behind when you go into the bush and put on a land caring one. Weeding in the bush needs to be done with a focus on improving the natural biodiversity of the area rather than eradicating every weed on site. We are not gardening the area; we are giving nature a hand. Improving biodiversity means improving the ecological function of the area. Think about what animals use the site. whether there is habitat for small birds, reptiles, invertebrates? What about the type and range of plants? This may mean certain low priority woody weeds are retained to provide habitat until they can be replaced, it may also mean woody debris is left on the ground to provide important habitat for fungi, reptiles and invertebrates, or to protect an area from grazing.
