Plant survey

On 20th December 1999 I recorded species growing around Tree No 289/2 in D2 (see the map of Cooleman Ridge). This is up from Chauvel Circle, and is included in the area slated for grazing. I repeated the survey this 31st October

In 1999 I found 41 natives and 19 exotics

In 2003 I found 35 natives and 21 exotics.

The big surprise was one *Diuris sulphurea* (Donkey Orchid) in flower, and not encountered previously here. The only other recording on the Ridge is the colony on Reet's patch, where one was found in flower 311003. Fortunately Reet's area is not scheduled for grazing.

Compression bandages

There were conversations at the AGM I would like to have followed up. Were there three brown snakes at the watering troughs at the same time, or could it have been one brown snake on three occasions? (rather than 1.5 brown snakes twice.) If they (it) are there for the water, how do they access it? Do the tanks leak? In any case you are strongly urged to always carry a compression bandage with you on the Ridge. Just wishing for one as a Christmas present (as I intend doing) is irresponsible. The venom travels via the lymphatic system (not in the blood stream) so bind from the bite towards the heart as firmly as possible and go straight to Emergency. Do not wash the area traces of venom can help with the choice of treatment. Always get bitten as far out on an extremity as possible. Q
