We were pleased to see the the track up the mountain had been cleared and the steps had been refurbished: thanks, PCS. On the way up, we cut down and dabbed a large cotoneaster bush, a weed still used for hedges in inner Canberra.

infestations of fleabane as well as the ever spreading St John's wort. This weed seems to be particularly vigorous everywhere around the ACT this summer. This was done mainly by clipping the flower heads, arguably more effective than trying to dig out the roots. We cut and dabbed the verbascum and dug out the fleabane. We finished back at Lincoln Pl. where Helen joined us with refreshments for morning tea and Ingrid surprised us with her herbal tea made from St John's wort!! Delicious and refreshing, is there a market??.
