Previous Sunday meeting, May 16th

This was a return to our northern group area (GAN/Chauvel), last visited on a very hot day in February. Not only was the weather kinder to us, but a fine turn-out of members resulted in an impressive amount of ground being cleared. It was good to show Crystal that we are an active lot and to introduce her to the local vegetation. We dealt with an invasion of *Acacia baileyana* from the track-side of the fence, but the parent colony requires firm action by EACT. A large patch of thistle, now in the rosette stage, will be on our agenda for next visit here – vital to keep it in check. The continuing parched conditions are taking a toll on some of our natives, notably *Hibbertia obtusifolia* and *Solanum cinereum*.

A survey netted 45 species of which 29 are native. ☼

Canberra Nature Park – Vision for the Future

Doug writes:

At a meeting at the Athllon Drive depot in November last year of Park Care groups and Environment ACT, the Conservation Council of the ACT was asked to initiate a workshop on the vision for Canberra Nature Park. This workshop was held in early May. Six members from our group attended with around 70 to 80 others.

Three hours were allotted to coming up initially with a vision for the next 20 to 50 years. This was a little ambitious and the task was scaled back to updating a vision of Canberra's bush reserves done a few years ago.

As might be expected, the task was not completed. Nevertheless, a lot of good suggestions were put forward. Subject to current workloads (coroner's inquiry etc.) Environment ACT undertook to collate and summarise the ideas of the individuals and groups listed on the ubiquitous butcher's paper stuck around the walls of the meeting room. This material would then be distributed to participants to refine and hopefully come up with a revised vision.

This exercise may sound somewhat removed from the hands-on approach to the Ridge that many of us consider worthwhile. However, it throws up questions such as:

(i) What are we trying to achieve eg. restoration to original vegetation (woody grasslands), better ecological function and habitat or a recreation area?

(ii) How to best manage weed control, biomass reduction and fire and by whom?

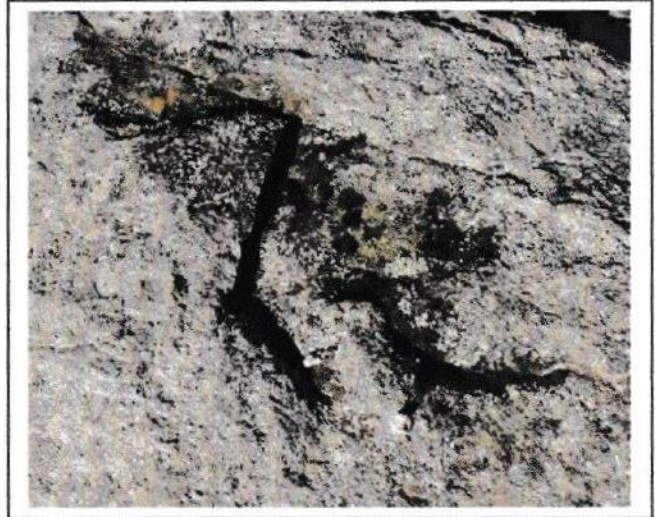
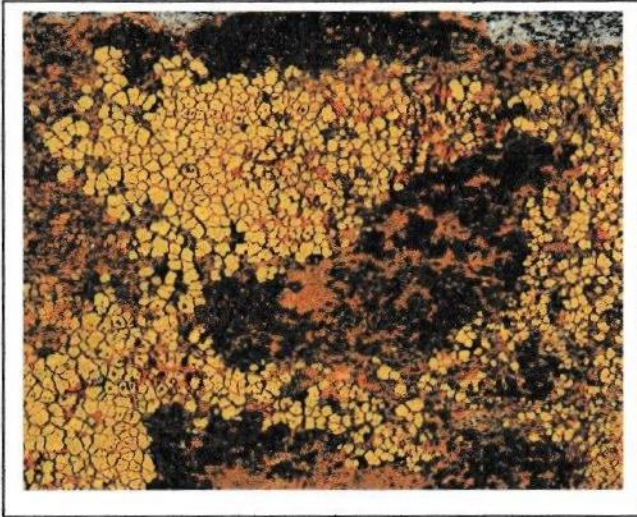
(iii) What is the role of park care groups in managing areas?

Prof. Elix was doubtful that any specimens would have survived the fire, and in that case there would be little point to a lichen theme walk for one of our Park Care Sundays. However, it proved otherwise. Knowing what to look for, Doug scouted Arawang and that's where Prof. Elix will guide us on our July meeting.

Lichen is a fungus/alga association and the small black fruiting bodies produce spores that can travel world wide to establish in seemingly hostile conditions.

We are delighted that Prof. Elix has agreed to lead our walk, and appreciate his willingness to share his enthusiasm with us.

By the time July 18th rolls around *Acarospora citrina* should slip easily from the tongue. ☺
